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Minutes –January 26, 2017 – General Meeting The Gem & Mineral Society Of Franklin, North Carolina, Inc.

The meeting was called to order by President, Tom Sterrett at 6:35 p.m. on January 26, 2017, at the Masonic Lodge.

Membership: Ellen Crawford reported 29 members and 1 guest present.

<u>Minutes</u> – Tom Sterrett asked if there were any corrections or additions to the last minutes and there were none. Norm Holbert moved that the minutes be accepted as printed and Ellen Crawford seconded the motion. Voted and carried.

<u>Treasurer</u> – Lake Holland reported that we were in the black for the month of December.

Museum Manager – Tom Marsh circulated the sign-up sheet for hosting on Saturdays for the month of February.

<u>Workshop Manager</u> – John Hayes arrived late, staying at the community center in case anyone drove there for the meeting, not knowing that the meeting place had changed. Thank you, John!

<u>Gift Shop</u> – Elena Marsh reported good sales. She and Anamay Rossomando were in Asheville earlier in January buying new items for the gift shop. She suggested we mention to guests about the raffle item, that we are all volunteers, and that donations help to keep the museum open.

<u>Publications</u> – Ellen Crawford reminded us that the newsletter will be combined for January and February. Deadline for submissions is March 7. Individual monthly publications will start with the March newsletter. Ellen also mentioned that she has updated our information with SFMS.

<u>Field Trips</u> – Marsha Harmon reported on six upcoming field trips this quarter: Diamond Hill, a private mine two hours drive away, a trip to Brookwood, Alabama, two scheduled trips to Chunky Gal and a trip to Hogg Mine in LaGrange, Georgia. She asked to be contacted if anyone is interested. She reiterated that one must be a member in order to participate.

OLD BUSINESS:

Tom Sterrett stated that we still need someone to volunteer as Calendar Chairperson. Please contact Al Pribble if you can volunteer for this important position.

NEW BUSINESS:

Mother's Day Gemboree – May 12, 13, &14, 2017 – Norm Holbert stated that as far as the construction is concerned at the Robert C. Carpenter Community Building, he has been told that it should be completed by the end of April but this is uncertain at best. Norm will check out the Armory and possible other venues and report back to us.

Tom Sterrett mentioned that the Board is considering renting a small space (\$216 annually) at the new Chamber of Commerce facility in Holly Springs next to Taco Bell.

New Budget – Tom Sterrett presented the new budget on screen and went over every item line by line.

<u>Leave A Legacy</u> – Tom Sterrett mentioned the Leave a Legacy campaign, money that would be utilized for new cabinets and displays in the museum, for anyone who would want to donate money in memory of a loved one or friend. A committee will be formed to coordinate this 3-year program. Brass donation plaques are planned to be attached to the cabinets. \$500 for a low cabinet; \$750 for a corner cabinet; \$1,000 for a medium 5 x 7 cabinet; and \$1,500 for a large 7 x 7 cabinet.

Norman Holbert announced that the faceter's group will meet at the museum on February 19 at 1 p.m.

In Memorial - David Snyder

On February 25, 2017 Dave Snyder passed away in Largo, Florida at the age of 94. Dave was a long time Life Member of the Gem and Mineral Society and was a driving force for many years in keeping the Museum and the Society going with his many thousands of volunteer hours, along with his wife Chick. Some of you may recall that Chick ran the gift shop. Chick passed in May, 2014.

In about 1988 Dave accepted the position of the Museum Manager and diligently served in that capacity until the spring of 2005 when he decided it was time to step back and let some of the younger, newer members who were interested in the position take over the reins and ensuing responsibility. While Dave served as the manager he saved the Society vast maintenance fees by taking on the majority of needed tasks, instead of paying contractors to take care of necessary repairs and improvements. Some of those tasks include: making roof repairs due to leaks, rewiring the building and putting in needed receptacles, replacing doorways and sills due to termite damage, painting throughout as needed, constructing the majority of the oak display cabinets along with the assistance of Vic Kuhn, installing window AC units for the first time, and Dave also constructed the florescent display case and installed that lighting which has proven to be quite popular with museum visitors. This list is not all inclusive, but covers some of those that stand out in my mind when remembering Dave and his devotion to the Museum.

Dave also served as the assistant manager of the Gemboree and then in about 1993 became the chairman of the Gemboree. Our members realize how important that event is to the club and the hours involved in the planning and work for that project. He also taught wire-wrapping at the William Holland School of Lapidary Arts in Young Harris, GA.

Dave and his wife Chick maintained their residence in Largo, Florida and also a summer mountain home near Franklin, N.C. Their winter months were spent in their Florida home, but the rest of the year they enjoyed being at their mountain home while spending countless hours working for the good of the Museum and the Gem and Mineral Society. We are grateful for their dedication to our club through the years.

Our condolences to Dave's children and grandchildren. May God bless his soul and comfort you in your loss.



Field Trip

On January 28, Vicki, Duane, Cy, and myself met Susan and Steven Martin on a trip to **Diamond Hill**. DMC hosted the trip and the Columbia Gem and Mineral Society sponsored it. Several very large beryl pieces, a double amethyst crystal, a triple skeletal crystal were found with many sightings of clusters gathered by various other clubs. Moderate drusy quartz filled most buckets. Diamond Hill lately requires hard work into fresh dirt.

February 18, **Brookwood**, **AL**, SE Federation trip sponsored by Alabama Mineral and Lapidary Society was attended by approximately 150 from various clubs including 3 of our members. Pudding stone, indian paint pots, agate varied in color, mostly red jasper, petrified wood, blue lace agate, oolite, marine fossils and I even found coal! Areas of mostly pebble shaped rock from potato sized to quarter size, made for great tumbling material and some suitable for cutting.

February 25, Carl, Will, Bobby, Vicki, and myself enjoyed a great introductory trip to **Chunky Gal.** There are several areas available to explore there. We chose to stay mostly on or near the top of the mountain and hunt smaragdite with rubies. Carl took a 10-lb. hammer and got to work on some huge boulders, which we had allowed to intimidate us in the past. Some nice specimens were taken this day.

March 4, Susan, Steven and I enjoyed the **Hogg Mine** in LaGrange, GA. Lots of rose/clear quartz, green mica, some black tourmaline in milky quartz and beryl mostly blue/green/pink was found in open pit mine/dump piles. Some beryl of possible facet-quality was found and the largest I saw was found by a man digging next to me. It was around a 50 cent piece in size, perfectly 6 sided, doubly terminated and about 3 inches in length.

Thank you all for the help you always provide when asked. Many hands make the task less stressful and gets things accomplished so much quicker.


Please stop by the museum any Saturday and visit. You will find it is a neat place to hang out with some great folks! See you there soon - Elena

Archie Campbell - Macon County Gem Mine Owner

Archie Campbell is a name that those of us who are older can remember well. For those of you who are a bit younger you can find him on reruns of "Hee Haw" on your television. Archie Campbell wrote, produced and acted in the show and has been quoted as saying that his favorite part was playing the barber.

Archie Campbell was mountain born, bred and educated. Archie was born in Bulls Gap, Hawkins County, Tennessee on November 7, 1914 and educated at Mars Hills College in Mars Hill, North Carolina where he studied Art. He began his career in entertainment at radio station WNOX in Knoxville, Tennessee where he worked with Roy Acuff on a program called Mid-Day-Merry-Go-Round. From Knoxville, he relocated to radio station WDOD in Chattanooga where he worked until 1941 when he joined the United States Navy. After the war ended he returned to Knoxville and the radio medium at station WNOX. From WNOX he went on to help start Knoxville's first country music television show.



WROL – TV's "Country Playhouse" ran from 1952 until 1958. From Knoxville, it was on to Nashville and the "Grand Ole Opry" and a recording contract with "RCA Victor" where he eventually had 3 top 30 singles. In 1969 he joined "Hee Haw" on CBS-TV as chief writer and on-air talent.

Like many men who manage to accumulate wealth the wealth is reinvested and frequently new careers are begun as businessmen. Archie Campbell was such a man. Archie was an avid golfer and built one of the nation's first lighted golf courses. He was also an ardent painter and eventually opened an art gallery and served on the school board in Knoxville where he lived. All this led him into associations with various groups of businessmen.

The television show "Hee Haw" was very popular and various businessmen convinced Archie to invest in the old "Glory Hole Mine" just north of Franklin, North Carolina. A new venue was planned and the mine was to be used as a means of developing new talent for his "Hee Haw" show. Archie claimed that there was tremendous talent to be found within a 200-mile radius of the new "Lost Mine at Gold City." Plans were made to reopen the mine on Memorial Day of 1970 with Andy Small as General Manager. Andy Small was a fast draw expert and was to be dubbed the "Honorary Marshall of Gold City."

"We expect to find and start several exciting new performers on their way to stardom. --- You know we have eight big saloon shows running with a continuous supply of fresh, new talent – most of them local, and all of them good" stated Archie. Several new features were added to draw the tourist in. One of them was trained animal acts which Archie laughingly dubbed "my competition."

The buildings and mine tours were at the top of the mountain but the gold panning and sluice mining was done at the base of the mountain. The dirt for the mining was trucked in from the Alice Mine now known as the Lyle Kolb Mine which is off Sanderstown Road and on the backside of the property which covered 317 acres. Claims were made that 63 different minerals were found beneath Gold Mountain. It was stated that the Alice Mine which was inaccessible to tourists and had the richest gem ore in the Franklin area which is known as the "Gem Capital of the World." Other attractions included the chair lift to the top of the mountain, guided horseback trips, pony rides for the children, nature trails, mine tours, picnic tables, food and drink establishments and gun fights. There was certainly enough there to keep you busy and entertained.

There were forces at work to bring this entertainment complex down before it could make a fair start. Both Curt Rhoades, the present owner of what is left of the property and Arlon Eldridge, a former manager at the "Lost Mine at Gold City" both attest to poor cost controls and poor management decisions. Arlon Eldridge told me that the cost of running the chairlift alone ran in the neighborhood of \$3,500 to \$4,000 a month and that the cost of the liability insurance matched the monthly payroll which numbered about 30 people.

The bell had tolled and the company filed for bankruptcy in the late 1980's. Mr. Rhoades, the current owner, told me that he purchased 48 acres of the property in 1992 and at the time of purchase he did not receive any of the mineral rights. The remains of the chair lift have been demolished.
