The meeting was called to order by Vice President, Arlon Eldridge on Thursday, October 25, 2018, 6:30 p.m. at the Robert C. Carpenter community building

<u>Membership</u> – Ellen Crawford reported 35 members and 8 guests present. We have a new member, Nancy Hopp, and Sherry & Scott Newton have rejoined us. Membership fees are past due. Those who do not pay by the deadline, December 1, will lose membership privileges.

<u>Minutes</u> – Al Pribble asked if there were any corrections or additions to the September minutes. Stacy Walbridge made a motion that the minutes be accepted as printed and Tom Parker seconded the motion. Voted and carried.

<u>Treasurer</u> – Kathi Walbridge gave the Treasurer's report; we are in the plus column for September.

<u>Museum Manager</u> – Duane Haskell indicated that the Leland cypress trees in the fountain area at the museum are overgrown. A horticulturist has been consulted and he recommends the trees be removed. We are going to contact the county to see if they can come to remove the trees as power lines are involved.

<u>Field Trips</u> – Marsha Harmon has a trip coming up on Saturday, October 27 to Diamond Hill. Ten have signed up so far. Carpooling will take place with everyone meeting at the museum and departing at 8 a.m. sharp. She would like to schedule some trips mid-week for those who work on weekends.

<u>Publicity</u> – George Fritz said he has ordered and received 25,000 brochures. He will be submitting a grant request to the Tourism Development Commission; perhaps we can get some or all of that money back through this grant.

<u>Gem Show</u> – Norm Holbert reported the October gem show was cancelled due to lack of vendors. We just received reimbursement for the July show, which indicated a nice profit. If attending other gem shows in another state or in our area, he asked that we consider talking to the vendors at those shows about participating in our own gem show here in Franklin in May.

October 27 eight members of our club visited Diamond Hill Mine. It is located near Abbeville, SC and is known for several types of quartz. Most of our group were able to locate milky, smoky and skeletal quartz by the bucket full. One cluster of amethyst and a quartz scepter was also found. Scepter quartz crystals are a naturally occurring formation where the base of a crystal forms around a central crystal rod. This one was a clear quartz scepter approximately 2 inches long and 1/2 inch in diameter. This was a fun trip despite the mud available after some rather heavy rains.

A short notice trip to Chunky Gal took place November 1 and a side trip to Deep Gap on that same day. Smaragdite with Rubies and Garnets both in good quantity were found. There will be more of the mid-week trips to come. Please call Marsha if you are interested.

After our program given by Ken Rush about the Ducktown Basin, several people have expressed interest in visiting this museum. This trip is scheduled December 8 leaving from the museum at 8 AM. ### A Calcite Cabochon

Fred Plesner - Curator Emeritus



I usually carry a calcite cabochon in my vest pocket when I am working at the gem museum. It is a token from my more youthful days as a novice in the Gem and Mineral Society. What makes this calcite cabochon so unique is that it has been dyed with beet juice.

At that time in my earlier days I had been hearing about various techniques for treating stones, being curious and knowing that calcite was soft I dropped my newly cut and polished stone into a jar of beet juice and waited. After 3 or 4 days I retrieved my stone and carefully washed it. It didn't turn out quite the way I expected it to. Instead of taking the hoped for color uniformly it was speckled with violet dots. Many people have looked at the stone and assumed that the spots in it are possibly garnets.

I am using this illustration as a means of encouraging you to follow your curiosity. Many of us have taken lessons at the museum and are curious about many things. If you are curious about how it may turn out, try it. It may be like my experience or it may exceed your expectations.

Some years ago, John Hays and I gave a talk at a local women's luncheon. I like the women present were impressed by the range of material that John Hayes had faceted, such as a stone cut from the screen of an apple computer. If you are curious, go for it and have fun finding your answer.
