Minutes-August 31, 2017-General Meeting The Gem & Mineral Society Of Franklin, North Carolina, Inc.

The meeting was called to order by President, Tom Sterrett at 6:35 p.m. on Thursday, August 31, 2017, at the Franklin Masonic Lodge.

Membership – Ellen Crawford reported 56 members and 2 guests present.

<u>Minutes</u> – Tom Sterrett asked if there were any corrections or additions to the July minutes and there were none. Norm Holbert moved that the minutes be accepted as printed and Marsha Harmon seconded the motion. Voted and carried.

<u>President</u> – Tom Sterrett reported that the eclipse packets of moonstone and sunstone were a success netting approximately \$1,000. He told the membership that Gwen Taylor of the Downtown Merchants Association visited the Board meeting and has invited us to join.

<u>Vice President</u> – Arlon Eldridge indicated that he will present the \$300 mini-grant to the teacher at Macon Middle School on Monday.

<u>Treasurer</u> – Lake Holland reported the month of July was extremely profitable, which drew applause from the members.

<u>Museum Manager</u> – Tom Marsh thanked those who volunteered their time and efforts to host at the museum during the eclipse weekend (he reported the museum was very busy) and also for those who volunteered to be at our table during the Cowee Heritage Festival.

<u>Workshop Manager</u> – John Hayes presented two Certificates of Completion for the cabbing class that was taught by Cy Amrich. Congratulations to Brenda Isaacs and Joe Laurello.

<u>Curator Emeritus</u> – Fred Plesner reported that the club has been offered the mineral rights to 36 acres of land and he explained that mineral rights and ownership rights are two entirely different things. The property is south of the airport and is steep. At the recent Board meeting, the Board decided to exactly locate the specific property, which has taxes of \$13 per year and a value of \$3,800. In addition, information will be given to an attorney to check all paperwork prior to the club accepting the offer.

<u>Gift Shop</u> – Elena Marsh reported an excellent month thus far. Raffle ticket sales, with the drawing to be in October, have been good. She reminded us that tee shirts are for sale and she brought some with her this evening. She reminded us again that she and Anamay Rossomando will be stepping down effective December 31, 2017. She is willing to train whoever may step into this position and she suggests two people; a manager and assistant manager. She has typed up a job description. Elena and Anamay Rossomando were given a big round of applause for her work over these last few years.

<u>Education</u> – Diane Aiello and Al Pribble will be doing a demonstration on September 26, 2017 at the Upper Cartoogechaye Community Club.

<u>Publications</u> – Ellen Crawford stated that the deadline for newsletter Tuesday, September 12. Membership dues are now due: \$20 for one member; \$10 for each additional family member and \$5 for Pebble Pups. Also, she stated that effective October, anyone desiring hard copy newsletters will be required to pay an additional fee of \$25 over and above their membership dues.

<u>Publicity</u> – Tom Sterrett thanked George Fritz for the two ads that were placed in the Macon County News and Franklin Press the Friday prior to the eclipse.

The Propst Farm, Lincoln County, NC is an area that has been reopened recently after land/permission changes. This dig was on August 26th, in hard-red clay to find Corundum crystals which are usually larger than those found in our area. Some Magnetite and Quartz/crystals are also found in this area. This trip was sponsored by Gaston County Gem, Mineral & Faceting Club. Thank you, Gaston County Gem, Mineral & Faceting Club for this opportunity.

The Franklin group pitched in together and worked at digging, screening and the cleaning processes. Gary Galbrecht brought almost all essential equipment as was listed on the DMC trip list. Sean Price, Ellen Williams and myself had bits and pieces to supplement his supply. After hard work, mostly small (1/4 inch some well defined) crystals were found and split among our 4 members. Some much larger crystals were found by the Gaston group and Aiken, Atlanta, and Charlotte Clubs had varied success. An Outlaw Haven

Macon county was settled in 1818 and all her best lands (the bottom lands) sold quickly. The rest of the lands (the ridges) remained on the market for quite some



time. This vast reservoir of unsold land gave room to a drifting population of what might "at best" be called a low-grade civilization for 20 years between 1820 and 1840. Many of these people stuck like burrs to the robes of Macon County's social character.

A look at Macon County's Superior Court docket during this tumultuous period attests to large numbers of petty theft, assault and battery, etc. During this period a rather respectable two-decked pillory and stock stood on the public square. A judge by the name of Robert Strange sat on the bench during this period and it was his custom to hear cases during the week and to withhold Judgment until the last day of court for the week. It was during this period that that a rather ludicrous incident occurred.

The sheriff took his convicted prisoners to the pillory and filled both the upper and lower decks, there were three prisoners left. The sheriff took the three men back to the judge, stated the facts and asked for instructions as to how he should dispose of the three men in question. The judge was both stern and curt in his reply. "Lift the corner of a rail fence, run their heads through the crack, and let them stand their time out there!!"

Linville Caverns

The colors of the cave formations were amazing, stalactites plentiful and even an underground stream with "native trout." It was a cool and incredible trip.
