A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE GEM AND MINERAL MUSEUM OF FRANKLIN Helen Coe, April 1976 Winnie Dalen Ketchem, February 1996

Founder's Day was November 10, 1971 when a group of interested rock hounds decided to form a



Gem and Mineral Club. They met at the Macon Savings and Loan Building basement on West Main Street. Mr. Dick Chmelick was the driving force with help from the Chamber of Commerce Director, Mr. M. R. Doster. On February 28, 1972 a Charter of Incorporation was issued. The official name became The Gem and Mineral Society of Franklin, NC. Inc.

By December 1972, the membership listed 102 adults and 15 minors. The financial report gave a balance of \$231.59.

Early in 1973 several members had an idea to create a museum to help promote the ideas of the society. They set their sights on the old jail, which was no longer in use. Permission to occupy the old jail building for a Gem and Mineral Museum was secured by two ladies who would later become Presidents of our society, Mrs. Ruth Davis and Mrs. Betty Lindner.

The Franklin Gem and Mineral Museum was born on June 2, 1973 when the Macon County Board of Commissioners granted the Gem and Mineral Society of Franklin permission to use the abandoned old Macon County Jail building, in which to establish a Museum, which would be open Free to the citizens of Macon County and the General Public.

Members set about securing funds for a museum by asking local merchants and interested persons to pledge \$50 or \$100 in return for a plaque name on our wall. Twenty two persons, members and local "citizens-who-cared" each gave \$50 to \$100 each, and thus became "museum Founders". Our lady members held two Bake Sales which added \$304 to the museum funds and also helped with an Antique Show and Sale that raised an additional \$360. Carpeting was given by generous local shops, also building materials – altogether these were worth \$700.

The challenge was given to our Society to create – to achieve – something permanent in our community.

This challenge was accepted by many of our members and they went to work.

Removing cell doors with picks and mallets, old wiring and older plumbing and toilets and shower stalls then shoveling it down to the dump filled the following days and weeks. Repairing a leaking roof, patching plaster walls, painting over graffiti of an offensive nature, new wiring and painting done by the Job Corps boys got the basic structure ready.

Nine display cases were built and display rooms wired, light fixtures and heaters installed along with paneling and a drop ceiling erected in the lower hall. Room for a library and Gift Shop was established and stocked.

Finally, after almost 12 months of work, the expenditure of over 2,000 hours of labor, and \$2,500, our museum opened its doors on May 25, 1974. It was a proud moment for many who had "Dreamed a Dream" and then worked hard to make it come true.

On June 30, 1974 an Open House was held and approximately 200 interested persons attended, many of whom were impressed by what had been done, and our members were proud of their results. The museum was closed for the winter on November 1, 1974. During the five months that it was open – 3,207 persons signed the Guest Book – from 41 of our United States and 4 Foreign Countries.

The museum was on its way – but more remained to be done. From January until May 1975 attention was given to the 2nd floor, where plans were made to create a Lapidary Workshop. Cleaning, repairing, and dismantling was carried out. Rest rooms were completed and the electrical wiring started. Six new display cases were built in order to hold all the materials being donated or loaned to the museum. Many Native American artifact were again loaned to the Native American Room for display.

The museum was opened for its second season on May 3, 1975. Again an Open House was held on



June 29 with approximately 150 people attending. The Gift Shop was an added attraction for many persons who visited the museum, and for 1975 it contributed over \$1,000 to the museum funds. \$190 was donated by visitors, some of the 3,947 who signed our guest Book and who came from 45 States and 12 foreign lands. The museum was closed for the winter on November 1, 1975.

During the winter months of 1975/1976 the workshop area on the second floor was greatly improved – work benches were built, wiring and lighting completed. Cabochon and Faceting Classes were started in March 1976 and have become quite popular with the students – our eager-to-learn members.
