Yet for the hardy volunteers and trusting DMC members it proved to be profitable for a few. Clay

Fred Plesner – Curator Emeritus



Over the many years that I have written for "The Mountain Gem" there is one subject

that I have never given any thought to and that is Clay. It's just that everyday common dirt that we walk on, but our red clay is a mineral and from time to time has been used to produce useful products.

The first use of that reddish sticky stuff that we find so hard to get off our shoes that comes to mind is our Native Americans. They used it to produce pottery. There are many examples of this in our "Native American Artifacts Room" in the Gem and Mineral Museum of Franklin. Some years ago, we gave the children who visited the museum pottery shards that had been collected at a site near "Pickens's Nose" in the north end of Macon County. There are still a few potters in the county who use our local clay to produce unique and or useful decorative items for sale.

When the Macon County Jail burned in 1849 a kiln was built on the Little Tennessee river near the foot of Iotla Street and the brick were fired there to rebuild the "Old Jail" which had recently been destroyed. In this particular case the prisoners were used to provide the labor to make and fire the brick that would be used for the rebuilding.



The next circumstance that I have found brickmaking mentioned is in 1904 when 150,000 brick where made. I can only speculate as to where they were used or shipped to, but fire had destroyed Mr. Pendergrasse's store on Main Street in 1904. Mr. Pendergrasse built a larger structure in brick in 1904 and that building is presently used by the "Macon County Historical Museum." Were those brick used for the rebuilding?

Macon County Gemboree

Another show is now history and for the most part was very successful. The inclusion of the Franklin Faceters' Frolic was great for both the Frolic and the Show. The attendance for the show was up and most vendors were happy with their sales. The club volunteers were present enough that our tables were



covered practically all the times. If I had any disappointments with our tables was with faceting demos. Virginia Bennis was the only volunteer when it came to faceting. She was there twice to demo and otherwise the faceting machine sat there with no one behind it or showing its use. All other demos went well and many club members gave very freely of their time to help make this show a success.

Just a note to alert you to the upcoming Leaf Lookers Gemboree (October 19-21). We'll again be looking for volunteers for manning the club table and demo area.

Minerals of the Museum: Kyanite

Within the North Carolina room at the museum is one of the few minerals that has a split personality. In one direction Kyanite can be as hard as quartz at a 6.5-7.0 Mohs hardness and in another direction, it can be as soft as fluorite with a Mohs hardness of 4.5-5.0. That property makes Kyanite a challenge to form into faceted gems but it has another unique property that makes it useful in the production of re-fractory products like bricks and porcelain. Unlike most minerals, Kyanite is one of the few minerals that expands when it is heated. Added to porcelain, Kyanite helps produce a strong and stable material in spark plugs, sinks, and bathroom fixtures.

With a chemical composition of Al₂SiO₅ Kyanite is classified as a silicate which are composed largely of Silicon (Si) and Oxygen (O). Kyanite is found mainly in metamorphic rocks and can be accompanied by Staurolite, Garnets, and Corundum. It is not uncommon to find Kyanite nearby in places like Buck Creek, Ellijay, Mason Mountain, and Winding Stair Gap. Perhaps on a future field trip or outing you may find the mineral with the split personality.
