Workshop Safety

The first thing we should think of is safety for our sight. It is probably the most important of our senses, especially in lapidary work. So, I want to urge everyone to wear safety glasses always when doing lapidary work. We have glasses available in the workshop and John Hayes will be placing signs to remind everyone to use them. We realize that we are all adults, and no one can be forced to use them, however, if it becomes necessary the Board can mandate that the use of the machines requires wearing safety glasses. I hope that everyone understands the need for this rule.

Secondly is the consideration of the clothing that we wear when using the machines. Loose fitting sleeves can become tangled in the rotating wheels and cause injury, so, be aware of what you wear.

Most safety rules involve common sense and consideration of what may happen. There are probably other factors I could mention, but these two will go a long way in keeping us all happy rock polishers.

Mineral Rights

Fred Plesner - Emeritus Curator

We, The Gem and Mineral Society of Franklin, North Carolina, Inc. are now the owners of the mineral rights to 38 acres of land. The site contains the remains of a once commercially operated mica mine. The deed to those mineral rights was duly registered at the Macon County Court House on January 23, 2018. These mineral rights are a taxable asset and all that would be necessary to divest ourselves of those rights would be to not pay the taxes and those rights would return to the land owners.

Mineral rights are not land ownership but only the rights to the minerals that lie beneath the surface of the land. Those mineral rights of necessity include the right of access (the right of trespass) to those minerals. We in turn must pay for any damages to any structures, fences, gardens or roads, etc. that we may damage. There is also the possibility that we may be held responsible for injuries to individuals.

Because of these responsibilities neither the name of the mine or its location will be released to the general membership until some basic ground rules are formulated and the property owners in question are notified. I, Marsha Harmon and Ralph Crawford have been on the property and we can attest that it is quite rugged and that there is no available parking. Because of these considerations offsite parking must be arranged, transportation to and from the site taken care of and some basic safety rules put in place before that first field trip takes place. Understand that any abuses of any rules set by the board of directors or the field trip chairman will have to be dealt with in a most severe manner.

I am sure that Marsha Harmon, our field trip chairman, will be diligently working with the board of directors and others to set everything in place so that first spring outing will be both a successful and joyful adventure.



Bench Tips by Brad Smith

Local Metals Source: Local companies that use sheet metal typically have barrels of scrap copper, brass and aluminum sheet that they save for recycling. The shop owner/manager will usually let you go through it to select the shapes and thicknesses you want. Prices vary but will generally be close to the wholesale per-pound scrap value. For me at this time, that's \$3 per pound for copper.

I've found it's much cheaper to buy metal this way than ordering from a catalog. There are no shipping



charges, and you'll be supporting a local small business in your community.

Remember to bring your work gloves if you try this. Also useful is a thickness gauge. When I asked if they had any 14 gauge, they didn't know. Turns out they measure the thickness of copper by its weight per square foot.
