November 18, Due West, SC - Amos Cunningham Farm - I had visited this location before but had not dug/searched here at that time. This is a Dixie Mineral Council (DMC) location and there were 8 Franklin Gem and Mineral Society members in attendance with 6 being new members. Always great having new members along! Franklin and General Electric

Fred Plesner - Emeritus Curator

In 1915 the General Electric Company was having a problem. Their growing telephone business was outstripping the available supply of mica. At that time nearly all their mica came from India and their search for domestic sources had failed because of the exacting standards required by the industry.

The company sent P. M. Marshall on a trip through the mica-producing areas of the south. After visiting numerous areas in the southern states, Mr. Marshall decided that Franklin, North Carolina would be the best location for General Electric's southern operations. The process would include both the purchase of mica direct from the mines and then "putting it into shape" for General Electric's use.

The company hired J. W. Roper to take charge of their Franklin operations. Mr. Roper was familiar with mica mining operations but not the industrial processes that met GE 's standards, so the first step was to get Mr. Roper trained. Mr. Roper was sent to Chicago for training and returned to Franklin in April of 1916 and deposited \$1,500 of GE's money in a local bank.

Local operations began in a cabin with three employees. By the end of the year, they had outgrown their cabin and moved into a larger and more substantial frame building. Seven years later they moved to the upper floor of the building that faces the public square and sits directly across from the Franklin Gem and Mineral Museum that Mr. Drake now uses for his computer tax operations.

From 1916 to 1919, General Electric spent more than \$20,000 through their Franklin office. By the mid '20's they were spending \$30,000 a year for labor and materials, not counting the cost of the mica that was purchased.



Domestic mica sources were proving inadequate to meet the company's needs so the Franklin processing plant began receiving shipments of raw material from India, Africa and South America.

I'm not sure when the plant closed, but it did continue to operate through the Depression years and thus provided good jobs for a number of local families during what must have been some very trying times.



Macon County Honors Our VETERANS

On the 11th month, the 11 day, at 11:00 AM Macon County honored it many Veterans. The parade down Main Street included veterans from WWII to the present day. The Franklin High Marching band provided just the right note as our veterans were applauded as they marched by. Mayor Bob Scott presided over a moving ceremony to pay tribute to our local veterans. The event was concluded with a wreath laying honoring those who did not come home.
